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Patient Dies 2 Days After Doctor Wanted to Discharge Him From Hospi- tal

Finally the wife convinces the doctor to go ahead and get an orthopedic consult. An orthopedist actually comes to consult with the patient and determines, "I've figured out why you can't walk. It's likely because when you fell, you ruptured your tendons. Just to make sure we're going to get an MRI for you tomorrow morning." He says, "Okay. Get me the answer. I want to be able to get up and be able to walk." Now a day later when he goes for the MRI what happens? As they're taking him downstairs he suffers a massive embolism, a stroke, a blood clot. Where does the blood clot wind up? In his lungs. That kills him. Now you might be asking yourself, what did the doctor do wrong here? Where was the violation for the basic standards of medical care? I'll tell you where the violations were.

Number one, this patient was overweight. That automatically put him at risk for developing a blood clot by sitting in a hospital bed for three days. Number two is that they never gave him any blood thinner medication. This patient had cardiac issues and he'd had a cardiac procedure before. Together with his being overweight, together with the fact that he had a cardiac history and now he's bed ridden for three entire days because he can't get up and walk, that puts him at a much higher risk of developing a blood clot and now this intern's failure to recognize together with the orthopedist's failure to recognize the likelihood and the risk of this patient developing a blood clot was very significant, and had they given him blood thinner medication, the risk of him developing a blood clot would have been extremely, extremely small and in all likelihood according to my medical expert, more likely than not this patient never ever would've suffered this type of blood clot that actually killed him.
